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Government Spending Review 2010

- Research Councils have submitted numerous delivery plan drafts to BIS
- Set out future priorities and plans against a range of funding scenarios
- Spending Review outcome announced 20th October 'maintaining resource spending in cash terms' – equates to an 8-9% reduction in real terms

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Government Spending Review 2010

- Some key issues...
 - MRC's 'expenditure' has been protected
 - Individual Council allocations yet to be announced
 - Capital cuts may be substantial, and possibly immediate
 - Administrative costs to be reduced over the SR period
 - o 'Wakeham' efficiency measures
 - Demand management
- Expect to publish ESRC Delivery Plan before Xmas

Strategic Priorities



- Seven key challenges
- Three strategic priorities
 - Economic Performance and Sustainable Growth
 - Influencing Behaviour and Informing Interventions
 - Vibrant and Fair Society
- These will relate to research but also training, resources, knowledge exchange etc

Strategic Priorities



- The priorities will be flexible and responsive; we will undertake annual reviews and consider refreshing
- They may require different levels of funding
- We will support new work, but also reviews of existing knowledge
- Need to maximise impact of existing investments and may need to ask some to refocus their activities
- Note, we remain committed to responsive mode grants

Impact Agenda



- Demonstrating impact will remain a central part of the ESRC mission
- Broad interpretation of impact
- Need to encourage academics to engage with the impact agenda
- RCUK pathways to impact

RCUK Collaboration



- Social science remains essential and central to all seven cross-Council themes (we contribute to all)
- The value of social science is recognised by all the Research Councils
- Inter-disciplinary research will continue to play an important role
- ESRC will remain committed to ensuring social science features in the whole RCUK research agenda

International Collaboration



- Continue to encourage and promote international collaboration across all our activities
- Focus on key international partners 3 RCUK offices
- Rationalise existing targeted schemes as with other areas of activity
- Develop innovative new ways of enabling international collaboration (e.g. Open Research Area)
- Actively encourage social scientists to engage with international funding opportunities – FP8

Collaboration and Co-Funding



- Build on existing proven mechanisms (e.g. placement fellows)
- Will extend role of ESRC as a knowledge broker
- 'Ventures' now the standard model for research programme funding
- Aim to increase business co-funding to 5% of external income by 2015 (e.g. Financial Services, Retail, Green Technology)



Data Infrastructure

- Strong data infrastructure is an essential core resource
- We support some of the world's leading studies
- Underpin research and training, and provide evidence to both academic and non-academic researchers
- Only ESRC supports these kinds of large, long-term investments
- The longitudinal 'jewels' appreciate in value
- Despite possible cuts to capital, we will protect a 'core' data infrastructure



Restructuring Schemes

- Fewer but more flexible research competitions
 - Integrate Postdoctoral Fellowships and First Grants –
 create a single 'Future Leaders' scheme
 - Merge Large Grants and Centres
 - Phase out Mid-Career Fellowships
 - Phase out current Small Grants scheme
- Result a simpler but coherent set of opportunities



Doctoral Training

- DTCs deliver postgraduate training through more strategic allocation of studentships
 - A cohort of students in each DTC
 - Move from accreditation to allocation
 - May have to discontinue open studentship competitions
 - Announce outcome in early January

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Managing Demand

- Current system is unsustainable manage around 3000 applications a year and success rates around 15%
- May require more self regulation in HEIs
- Considering a range of options:
 - Measures including tougher sifting, no resubmissions
 - Institutional sanctions
 - Institutional quotas
 - Charging for submission of applications
- Overall strategy may include range of measures
