

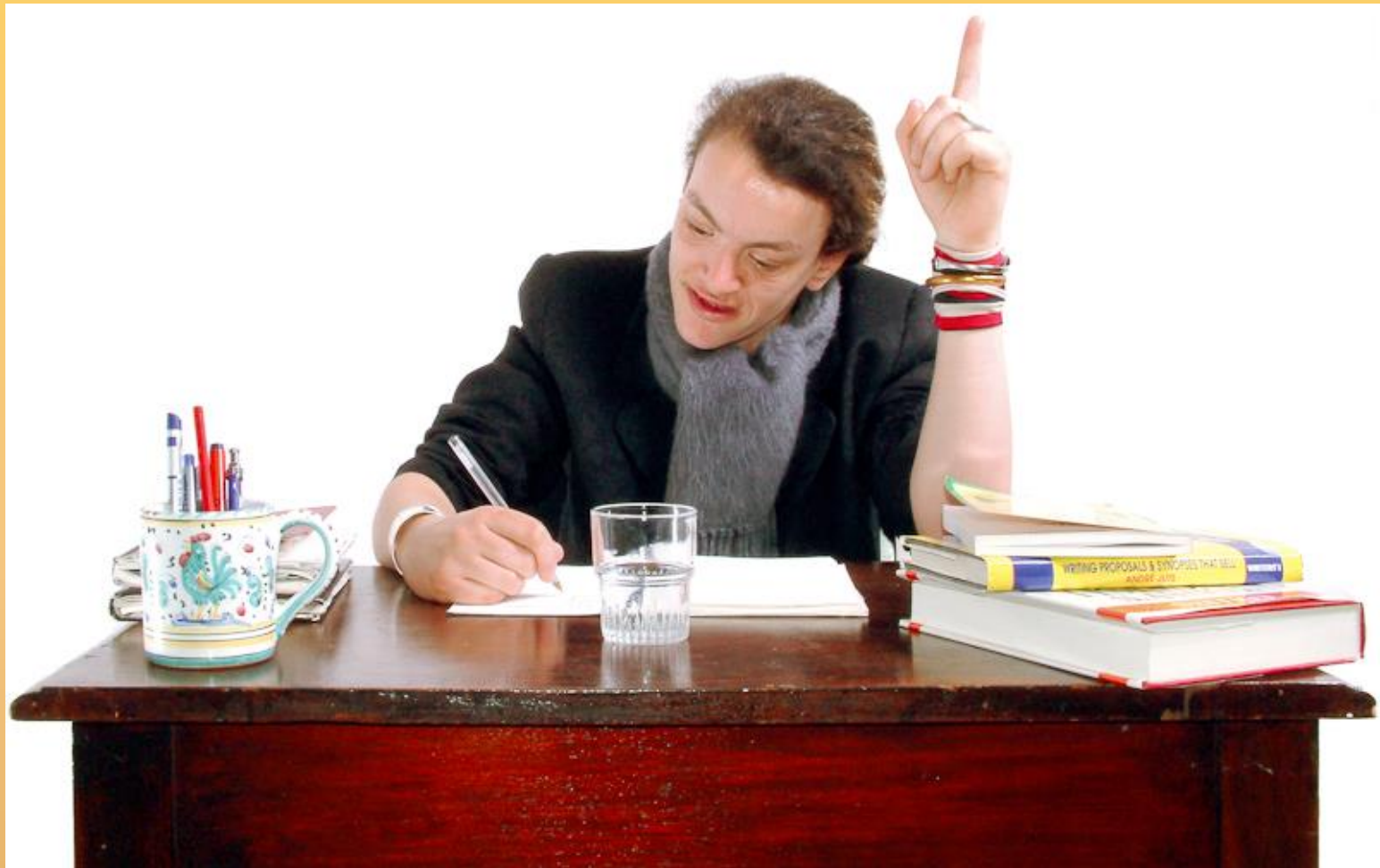
“What do university people know about people with a learning difficulty?”
